At the same time, the Law "On State Language" consisting of 30 articles was adopted. After our country gained independence, the development of the state language reached a new stage. In particular, on December 21, 1995, the Law of the Republic of Uzbekistan "On the State Language" was adopted in a new version. The previous law consisted of 30 articles, but after the new edition, it was reduced to 24 articles. Article 1 of the law states that "Uzbek is the state language of the Republic of Uzbekistan". This article itself requires that all work related to documents in our republic should be conducted in the state language. This is in line with Article 4 of the Constitution of the Republic of Uzbekistan, which states: "The state language of the Republic of Uzbekistan is the Uzbek language. The Republic of Uzbekistan ensures respect for the languages and customs of all nationalities and peoples living in its territory, and creates conditions for their development. ". Several Resolutions were adopted by the Cabinet of Ministers to ensure the implementation of this law. Classes were introduced in higher education institutions. The immediate goal was to improve our native language. This law played an important role in the development of the national consciousness of the Uzbek people, in strengthening the country's independence, and in the restoration of our cultural heritage.

We would not be wrong to say that the adoption of this law brought a lot of relief to the citizens. In particular, documents of local authorities and administrative bodies are conducted in the state language. In places where representatives of a particular nationality live, documents of local

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authorities and administrative bodies are regulated in the state language of the republic and in the language of the said nationality.

In the Republic of Uzbekistan, notarial actions and documents related to citizenship status are provided for translation into the state language or, depending on the need, into another language (Articles 12, 13).

As President I.A.Karimov rightly noted, "the Uzbek language has become one of the sacred symbols protected by law, which stands among the flag, coat of arms, anthem, and Constitution of our independent state." Therefore, every citizen living in our country, in addition to his mother tongue, must also know the state language, which is considered a sacred value.

So, our state has created all the opportunities and conditions for the development and prosperity of the Uzbek language. Now let's look at the other side of the issue. The Uzbek language is one of the richest and most beautiful languages in the world. We all know how difficult it is to acquire our mother tongue. Therefore, it is the sacred duty of each of us to preserve and protect our mother tongue. However, if we look at the current era, we can see that the Uzbek language has come to the edge of the cliff. The saddest thing is that we ourselves are the cause of this... At the moment, we are not enriching our native language with "wonderful" words coming from other languages in the process of globalization. "Ok", "Yeah", "Ladno", young people who use these words in both sentences, do not know what the words mean and what language they belong to.
